

WHY NOT CYCLE?

Cyclists will give you a dozen reasons why they ride. But the underlying reason behind them all is fun and freedom.

"Cycling is fun and you can run red lights." "Oh sure, bikes are great, but you gotta have room for cars." "Biking is dangerous! And besides, there are lots of things you can't carry on a bike." Who better to challenge these preconceived ideas than a Dutchman living in France? Few people know that, before the Netherlands became known as a paradise for cyclists, the car was king. That was in the 1970s, before citizens started a remarkable bicycle uprising, one that proved the pedal revolution is first and foremost a matter of political will.

With wicked humour, van Oosteren explains why we need to make our cities

bikeable: because it's good for our health, our morale, our children's independence, the life of our neighbourhoods, the planet, and so much more! One by one, he tackles the many political and psychological roadblocks to cycling. Based on his experiences debating the topic with elected officials, the author believes that it's time we started asking the real questions about transportation. For instance: not "how many cars can drive on a street", but rather "how many people can use it"? Bike paths can accommodate seven times as many people as car lanes, so the math is easy!

To believe in change, you have to experience it first-hand. Because he can't take you with him to the Netherlands, van Oosteren helps you to see public spaces from his Dutch point of view. You'll return happy and amazed, as if you'd actually visited the bicycle kingdom, and say to yourself: "The question isn't 'why cycle,' it's 'why *not* cycle'"?



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Spokesperson for the Collectif Vélo Île-de-France, Franco-Dutchman **Stein van Oosteren** has been contributing to the discussion on cycling in France since the release of the documentary *Why we cycle*? in 2017. *WHY NOT CYCLE*? is his first essay.

TRAVEL BUG, THE LATEST DISEASE?

Transportation and freedom Laurent Castaignède

Engineer Laurent Castaignède tackles the health-related, social and environmental consequences of our hypermobility head on.

It's high time we took a closer look at the serious health-related, social and environmental consequences of the "travel bug" – this "craving to travel; strong desire to see different places" that has rapidly turned into a global phenomenon for humans and goods alike.

Laurent Castaignède puts on his epidemiologist hat to analyze this new disease, born of proliferating modes of transportation – cars, planes, trains, boats – that promise comfort, happiness and freedom. The travel bug is an insidious disease that is becoming increasingly widespread, despite mounting evidence of the damage motorized transportation inflicts on the planet. While this hypermobility is a powerful economic driver, the attendant severe climate "side effects" call for emergency measures.

REAL LIFE IS HERE

Can we still travel?

Tourism is one of the industries that has had the strongest growth over the past few decades. Practiced by a tiny minority of the world's population, it harms people, landscapes and territories, even inww its "greenest," most "responsible" forms. What does this mean ? Under these conditions, should we travel at all ?

Such is the wide-ranging issue that Rodolphe Christin asks us to consider in this short and powerful book. Following up on the devastating critique of tourism he articulated in Manuel de l'antitourisme (Écosociété, 2017), here, he focuses on travel itself and the possibilities it represents in today's world. Indirectly, he is responding to the opposition between tourism and travel that often comes up in debates around these issues. Christin argues that tourism is above all economic, while travel is essentially a philosophy. It is possible, therefore, "to see here and there, navigating on undeniably imaginary and probably irrepressible waters, some of its most meaningful forms".

This very successful essay shows how the planet's #1 industry — tourism impacts the environment, foreign "destinations", as well as our own mindscape. Rodolphe Christin's delicate musings about the packaging of territories, globalization, and the fallacy of "sustainable tourism" are thought-provoking. 

Can we be eco-warriors and stay true to our principles ? This hard-hitting book is a must-read if we want to stay on the right path and preserve our living planet.

If everyone - from Emmanuel Macron to Jeff Bezos, and even Coca-Cola - is green, why is the environmental crisis growing at an alarmingly rapid rate? With the world population already experiencing the impact of climate change, not all of us are equally exposed to its violent effects. Environmental protection continues to be a divisive issue, with steadfast supporters but equally real enemies, some of whom stoop to greenwashing. The purpose of this book is to draw the battle lines.

To avoid being duped by false allies and create an ecology for the 99%, we must discuss a taboo topic: the exit from capitalism. Basically, this book is a crash course in the economics of capitalism and political strategies, an attempt to build a grassroots environmental movement by launching a discussion about some persistent myths. It presents compelling evidence why carbon market policies will fail, why a capitalist economy cannot be based on renewable energy sources, and why we should be protesting against overproduction, not overconsumption.

Time is running out, we can't afford to take any wrong turns.

THE MYTH OF HUMAN ENHANCEMENT

A political and environmental criticism of transhumanism

Nicolas Le Devédec

Understanding the true nature of transhumanism and the capitalist model of society behind it

The goal of the transhumanist movement is to enhance human physical and mental capacities through augmentation procedures. Among its mind-boggling claims are that it can optimize our cognitive abilities, adapt the body to extreme conditions, select the genes of unborn children, and transcend sickness and death. But, while these procedures are promoted as the ultimate path to individual empowerment, instead they simply serve to feed productive capitalism.

Sociologist Nicolas Le Devédec highlights the relationship between transhumanism and neoliberalism, whose main goal is to "actively reconfigure individual and collective human behaviour so it conforms to the market and corporate model". Internalizing the norms of self-improvement and performance that transhumanism promotes drives people to view their bodies as capital to be maximized, or as a resource to be exploited. Viewed in that light, the augmented human is the ultimate neoliberal subject. As proof of his theory, the author points to the popularity of smart drugs and psychostimulants in such diverse fields as healthcare, transportation and finance: their use clearly meets the need for workers to constantly produce more in less time. Freeing ourselves from the false promises of transhumanism means breaking out of the paradigm of unfettered growth in which it is rooted.

It's obvious that transhumanism is not the liberating agent we've been told it is, but rather a means of alienation and exploitation. Indeed, it would be unrealistic to "believe that technological breakthroughs conceived in, by and for the capitalist society, would in any way help slow the pace and reduce the amount of work. Moreover, because of its focus on mastering and controlling nature, transhumanism has a potentially destructive effect on the living world. Confronted by transhumanism, whose goal is to change human beings in order not to change the world, we must first reclaim our political freedom, and then establish a new relationship with the natural world and with living beings, human and non-human.

SHOULD WE END CIVILIZATION?

Primitivism and collapse

Pierre Madelin

We must reject the primitivist theories that are supposedly helping us cope with the current environmental crisis.

Ten thousand years ago, the foundations of civilization were laid by human settlement, the birth of agriculture and the formation of the first states. But what if, as primitivists claim, this Neolithic revolution was only an unfortunate interlude in human history? And what if, far from having a civilizing influence, these events instead launched human beings on a self-destructive path of environmental devastation, of which we are only now becoming aware?

Pierre Madelin uses these questions, which have dominated the environmental debate since the 1960s, as a springboard to examine the historical and anthropological bases of this theory, which posits that domination in all its forms is not inherent to social life, but are instead the result of the Neolithic period's prehistoric catastrophe. But primitivism is a political dead end, argues the author. Rather than mythologizing prehistoric life while we wait for industrial civilization to collapse, wouldn't it be better if we worked towards transitioning to an agroecological society?

LOSE THE SOUTH

Decolonize International Solidarity

Maïka Sondarjee

Has the time come to develop a moral and political position that would enable us to show greater solidarity with peoples of the South? Asking us to genuinely rethink North-South relations, Sondarjee puts forward a new framework for analysis and action: radical internationalism. Distinct from liberal internationalism, alterglobalization or deglobalization, radical internationalism provides a progressive, intersectional and multilateral vision of international politics. Sondarjee's book also proposes to define an alternative based on solidarity before nationalism, and to offer concrete political and economic solutions that would allow us to leave neoliberal globalization behind.

Although the left often claims to be "internationalist" or to support "alterglobalization", it does not consistently or coherently include the exploitation of people living in the global South in its analysis of the capitalist system. Few are willing to explain what a truly progressive foreign and multilateral policy would look like. And while the economic transition is often mentioned, we forget to say that ending the exploitation of other parts of the world is the only way to carry out a just transition towards another system.

Derived from a moral position that is intended to make the Other a part of our concept of politics, radical internationalism could be the basis for rehabilitating practices such as international cooperation and official development assistance.



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Maïka Sondarjee has a Ph.D in political science from the University of Toronto, where her thesis analyzed the inclusion of populations from the South in the development of World Bank policies. She is now a researcher at the International Development Research Centre (IDRC). Her interests include approaches based on feminism, decolonialism and criticism of international systems, and she is also a founder of InformedOpinions, a group working to amplify women's voices in the media.

PERVERSE TOTALITARIANISM

On a Multinational and its Power

Can the word "totalitarianism" describe the power of multinationals as it has been instituted and imposed since the early twentieth century? Modern political thought holds that the subjects of a collectivity are supposed to obey not the powerful, but the law. Perversely, however, that situation has been reversed. Today, multinationals ensure that the deliberations of political assemblies are subject to other "laws," their laws, whose effectiveness they uphold – "laws" of the market or competition. Total, the French multinational, is a textbook case. This book examines how it has established itself as a sovereign private authority, in a process that has been imitated by other multinationals. Total has become a power distinct from states – one that dominates them, takes them over, and uses them as tools in order to to rule, and to extract resources, through the oligopoly that it forms with its peers.

ECONOMIZING HATRED

Essays on Censorship

When we are expected to love money no matter what the cost, there is no hatred of the economy. There is, however, an economy of hatred. The program is clear: economizing hatred. Hating so that it doesn't show; investing oneself in being enslaved by money. Beneath the data, the calculations, and the speculation are crimes, blood, theft, and deaths, hidden behind economic knowledge and its legal prerogatives. Money is a screen. Is it necessary to relocate factories, lay off workers, pollute rivers, evade taxes, support dictators, or arm warlords in order to make sure that a share price goes up the stock market? The culture of money is precisely what authorizes us to economize these questions – to do without them – through self-censorship. One by one, Alain Deneault pulls apart the threads that make up the web of this diffuse censorship, so that we can free ourselves from the market filter that codifies social life.

The internet is full of fake news, and it's all the fault of social media. Not so fast! For this media sociologist, things are not so straightforward. Are we really living in a post-truth era? 

THE AGROECOLOGICAL REVOLUTION

Feeding everyone without destroying the planet

Alain Olivier

The global food system needs a rethink, and this complete guide to agroecology is the perfect place to start

Are we ready for the agroecological revolution? There's no longer any doubt that the Green Revolution of the 1960s failed and that the current global food system is dysfunctional. Just look at the issues: soil depletion, biodiversity loss, health problems from pesticides, millions of people with nutritional deficiencies, not to mention farm debt, the privatization of life, and the fact that agribusiness giants control the seed supply and food distribution systems. It's high time we brough agriculture in line with environmental concerns.

The author uses his experience as a teacher and agricultural researcher to take the reader step by step through the scientific principles and agricultural practices of agroecology, which focus on proper soil management, recycling the plant and animal biomass, and protecting water and ecosystems. Crop rotation, mixed cropping, agroforestry and integrating livestock in a sustainable way should be the norm. Because agroecology recognizes the value of the soil, farmers' knowledge and the role of women, one of its core tenets is that the people who feed us must have access to land and seeds.

In the current context of climate change, sustainable practices, social justice and food sovereignty should be the main pillars of agroecosystems and food systems in general. Agroecology – a broad social movement whose goal is to establish more sustainable and more equitable practices – is our best shot at transforming the relationship between human beings and their food, their land, and an exhausted and depleted natural world.



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Professor at Université Laval's Faculty of Agriculture and Food Sciences, **Alain Olivier** holds the Chair in International Development and heads the Interdisciplinary Research Group in Agroforestry (GIRAF). In 2004 he received the Prix international La Recherche, Environment category, and in 2016, the Prix d'excellence en enseignement from Université Laval for his work in the internationalization of education.

A modern capitalist tale, in which transporting black gold by rail claims 47 lives

"Some men, my child, are capable of spreading ruin and sorrow without even a hint of shame. Alas, their shadow has fallen on our little town." Thus speaks a grandmother to her granddaughter about the tragedy in which they both perished on July 6, 2013 in Mégantic.

Author Anne-Marie Saint-Cerny has chosen these two characters to tell this modern-day capitalist tale, skilfully illustrated by Christian Quesnel. Who are the real culprits in the tragedy that claimed 47 lives? How could a train with 72 tank cars of flammable crude be operated by just one man?

Set in motion by Wall Street investors, cowboy producers of Dakota black gold, and oil conglomerates, and enabled by politicians who turned a blind eye, the tragedy struck a community that, even in the immediate aftermath of the event, found itself at the mercy of local developers and financial interests that were often far from well-intentioned.

The train left from North Dakota, USA. "But that's so far away..." exclaims the granddaughter. "The evil smell of oil permeates the entire planet, my child," replies the grandmother.

Much more than a human-interest story, the tragedy is a disturbing example of so-called "shock doctrine". Based on the essay, *Mégantic : une tragédie annoncée*, the graphic novel powerfully illustrates the terrible events themselves and the search for culprits.

Christian Quesnel is a graphic novel author and the recipient of numerous awards for his work, including *Cœurs d'Argile*, *Ludwig*, *Félix Leclerc: L'alouette en liberté* and *Vous avez détruit la beauté du monde*, which won the Grand prix de la ville de Québec in 2021.

Author, researcher and activist **Anne-Marie Saint-Cerny** arrived at the site of the tragedy five days after it occurred. *Mégantic : Une tragédie annoncée* won the 2018 Prix de l'essai Pierre Vadeboncoeur and was shortlisted for the 2018 Governor General's Award for Literary Merit and the 2019 Prix des libraires.

"The truth is that I was born in Québec, that my family has lived on their traditional lands for over 200 years, and yet I know almost nothing about them and I don't know a single Aboriginal person. The truth is that I'm ashamed of myself ... ashamed of us."

After meeting with members of New Zealand's Maori people, Emanuelle Dufour realized how little she knew of about Québec's First Nations. When she returned, she began the process of learning more about the everyday life of the Aboriginal people and launched a timely and important dialogue. Why do our history books ignore the residential schools, and why do "Indian" stereotypes still appear in pop culture? How did Aboriginal people experience the Oka crisis? Based on her own experience, but also drawing on the experiences of many indigenous and non-indigenous people, this multi-faceted book explores the legacy of our colonial past and brings to light stories that have remained in the shadows for too long.

"Québec was founded in my country!" says Anna Mapachee, turning the tables on our colonial past. While systemic racism still shapes the Aboriginal condition, this meeting journal also bears witness to the work being done by different communities to reclaim their languages, their ancestral knowledge and their identities, at such places as the Kiuna College in Odanak, "a school just for us".

How about you? Are you ready to find out what role you can play in the story?


HOW (AND WHY) I BECAME A VEGAN
